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
Hedgerow Heroes Explorers Guide

For this activity you'll need a hedgerow that's been growing for a while.


Exploring your local hedgerows

F. Has a body length of just 6–9cm and a tail of similar length, weigh no more than 40g and are at their heaviest just before hibernation.


G. Lay white eggs on young Blackthorn shoots.

Hedgerow art explorers - leaf prints

A step by step guide to making your own colourful prints.



You'll need:

- Real leaves
- Poster paint
- Paint brushes
- Paper

- 1.Collect leaves of different sizes and shapes
- Choose some different colours of paint – make sure it's spreadable and not too runny
- 3. Take one leaf. Flip it so that the underside is facing up. Paint the entire surface of the leaf.
- 4. Carefully place the leaf, painted side down, on your paper. Press firmly for several seconds to transfer the paint from the leaf to the paper.
- 5.Remove the leaf to reveal a leaf print.
- 6.Repeat the process using different colours and other leaf shapes to fill your paper with leaf prints. Once you're happy with how your picture looks, allow the paint to dry completely.

A haiku is a special kind of short poem. It has three lines. The first line has five syllables or beats, the second has seven, and the third has five again. Haiku came from Japan and have been used for over 400 years. Most haiku focus on images from nature like wildlife, plants or the weather.
